

GLEN TANA PUBLIC ACCESS FAQS

We're excited to open Glen Tana for public recreation, but in the meantime, we ask for your patience and cooperation to ensure a safe and successful restoration.

- Safety First: Glen Tana is an active work site where we're improving forest health, treating invasive species, upgrading infrastructure, and operating heavy machinery. Unauthorized access poses risks to both visitors and workers, potentially delaying critical work.
- Liability & Protection: For safety and legal reasons, anyone entering the property without permission does so at their own risk. INLC is protected under RCW 4.24.630 and retains the right to take action against trespassing or property damage—though we hope never to be in that position.
- **Opening Glen Tana Sooner:** We share your excitement about exploring Glen Tana, and we're working diligently to meet key milestones before opening it to the public. Unplanned disturbances or damage can slow our progress, delaying access for everyone.

Your support helps us complete this important work efficiently so Glen Tana can be enjoyed by all. Thank you for respecting the process!
